Dr Sani Aliyu is a joint consultant specialising in medical microbiology and infectious diseases with an interest in antimicrobial stewardship and HIV epidemiology at the University of Cambridge hospitals where he is also the Caldicott Guardian. He graduated from Ahmadu Bello University, Zaria and completed a Master's programme in Medical Microbiology at Queen Mary University of London. He was Nigeria's Director General of the National Agency for the Control of AIDS (NACA). He is co-author of 69 peer-reviewed papers as well as four book chapters. His publications span a wide range of varied interests developed over his career including molecular diagnostics, infectious disease epidemiology and antibiotic stewardship.






Dr Dami Collier is a clinical scientist in infectious diseases and virology at the university of Cambridge. She graduated from Imperial College Medical school and completed her PhD in intra-host evolution of HIV and SARS-COV-2 at UCL with the Wellcome trust. She worked at the African Health Research Initiative (AFRI) where she facilitated the HERB (HIV escape and resistance in the brain) study, which aimed to investigate the occurrence of independent replication of HIV in the brain of South African patients with neurocognitive impairment and to study the evolution of drug resistance in these compartmentalised viruses. She has published extensively in HIV and TB literature.



Dr Ngozi Edi-Osagie qualified from University of Benin, Nigeria and was appointed as a consultant neonatologist in 2002 at Manchester University Foundation Trust (MFT). She is a Visiting Professor at Manchester Metropolitan University and is Group Associate Medical Director for professional matters, dealing with fitness to practise issues for over 2000 doctors at MFT working closely with the GMC. She is involved in external investigations & peer review of clinical services and was one of the neonatal investigators for the recently published Ockenden report. She is the Medical Lead for the Caribbean and African Health Network (CAHN) and the Chair of the national Neonatal Critical Care Clinical Reference Group (CRG). She was the chair of the MANSAG judicial advice sub-committee for 6 years.



Dr Sekina Bakare is currently an Intensive Care Medicine and Anaesthetic Higher trainee at The Royal Brompton Hospital. She received her Medical Degree from the University of Bristol with Honours and underwent Foundation training in the West Country before moving to North-West London for Specialty Training. She is an elected member of the Trainee Advisory Group of the Intensive Care Society, and sits on the society's Equality, Diversity, and Inclusion Working Group. 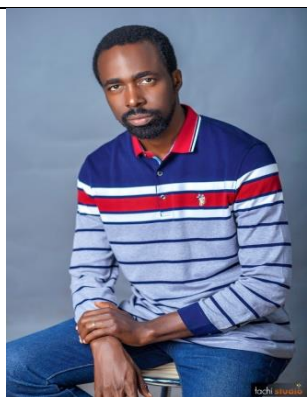
